SELF-CONTROL: When Our Lord speaks in today’s Gospel about cutting off one’s hand or foot or plucking out one’s eyes his words are not to be taken literally. He is using hyperbole. He is not speaking of self-mutilation. He is emphasising the need for self-control in our lives. Our hand can be a means of wrong-doing if we use it, for example to steal or damage someone’s property. But our hand is only an agent of our mind and will. They are the directing forces which need to be checked. Similarly, our feet can lead us astray into occasions of evil; they too need to come under the influence of our will to restrain them. Our eyes can be used either for our spiritual benefit or for immorality. We must be our own surgeon in the sense that we must cut out of ourselves evil tendencies and evil promptings of the will that can so easily ruin our lives.

If then we realise that we are God’s children, we must, at the same time, understand that we should live under his discipline and must use our faculties in his service and not in the service of evil. This will at times involve self-denial. We may have to close our eyes to certain things which attract us. We may have to say “no” to our hands and feet. Always there is the choice between self-control or self-destruction. This is what Christ is saying in the Gospel. The choice is between the kingdom of Heaven and being eternally cut off from God. We have not got the freehold of our bodies. They are given to us on earth to use in God’s service. He is our landlord to whom one day we must give an account of ourselves.

Always during our life, he has supplied the means by which our eyes and hands and feet could have a divine purpose and significance. It would be much better for us to be without them if that divine purpose and significance is ignored or frustrated through evil use.

The NSW Department of Education will also advise schools to inform families of the availability of these resources.

Closure of Churches due to the recent spread of the Corona virus.

As from 6pm on Saturday, 26th June 2021, Greater Sydney (which includes the Blue Mountains, Central Coast, Wollongong, and Shellharbour) has gone into an indefinite lockdown. Consequently, the Church is closed until further notice.

However, *funerals are permitted* with a limit of 10 attendees, in addition to those essential for the service (celebrant, undertakers, musician/singer, streaming operator).

Weddings are now permitted for small groups: 5 guests only, in addition to those necessary for the liturgy (i.e. the couple, the two witnesses, the celebrant and probably a musician/singer, and photographer).

Baptisms *are not permitted*, except in case of emergency. Similarly, the anointing of the sick, and sick calls generally, are permitted in case of emergency only.

It seems clear that, because the new Delta strain of Covid virus is so infectious, we are being asked to be even more cautious than during the previous lockdown. “Stay home” means “avoid all unnecessary contact with other people, including family members who live in other households.” Those who live in the Liverpool, Campbelltown, Canterbury-Bankstown, Georges River, Fairfield, Cumberland, and Blacktown Local Government areas, are required to remain in those areas unless they have a valid reason to leave for work (which requires at least one dose of a Covid 19 vaccine and a medical contraindication certificate which must be carried along with the required evidence of exemption to travel).

During the lockdown, the Sunday Mass will be live streamed on YouTube, and you are encouraged to connect prayerfully to this medium. The streaming will begin at 5pm on Saturday and can be accessed at any time after the Mass has concluded.

Mass will also be streamed on Thursdays at 12 md for the teachers and children of St. Joseph’s School who are at School or at home with their parents.

Message from the Parish Priest

It has now been three months that our parish community in Oatley, along with the rest of New South Wales is in hard lockdown. The cases of infections from the Delta strain of the Corona virus are increasing each day, and there have been several deaths either from or with the virus. Viruses can never be totally eradicated and will continue to circulate in the community and infect many people. The solution is protection from the virus. To do this, we have been placed in a strict lockdown to curb the spread of the Corona virus, and isolated from one another. We cannot remain in this situation forever. Since the emergence of the Corona virus at the beginning of last year, effective vaccines have been developed, and, of course, the best protection from any virus is scrupulous hygiene and vaccination. We are fortunate the Corona vaccines (Pfizer, AstraZeneca and Moderna) are now readily available and rolled out. The Premier and her Health advisors are constantly urging us to have the vaccination whenever possible. This will be a passport to resuming a somewhat normal life as before the pandemic and to protect us from further outbreaks. I have been fully vaccinated with Astra Zeneca, and I urge all Parishioners who are eligible to be vaccinated as soon as practicable. Sound health advice says that we have nothing to fear from this, and any risks are far outweighed by the protection the vaccines afford.

We are all going through a very difficult time at present. The lockdowns have caused many people to lose their jobs and their incomes. Children are deprived of normal school attendance and face to face learning. People who live alone lack the company of friends and relatives and, people and families are separated from one another. Our spiritual wellbeing, as a Catholic Community, is centred on the Eucharist, the summit and source of our faith. It is the Eucharist that binds us together as one and nourishes and strengthens us to live our baptismal commitment as the Body of Christ. For some time now, we have been unable to assemble as a Christian Community or have only been allowed to assemble in smaller numbers. It is still uncertain as to when we will be able to come together once more in our parish Church to fully participate in the Liturgy of the Church and to be refreshed with the Body and Blood of our Blessed Lord by our reception of Holy Communion. Nevertheless, we are fortunate that we have the advantage with modern technology to be able to participate in Masses that are live-streamed. When I arranged for this facility to be installed in our parish last year it was at the time when things started opening again, and our congregation was returning to Mass, albeit with reduced numbers. Now, it has proved its worth and we are able to live-stream the Mass every week so you can participate at home. I have also started to live-stream Mass on Thursdays for the benefit of the children at school or at home. This, of course, is not the best solution, but it is the next best thing. Nothing will ever replace actual attendance at Mass with a real and conscious participation, and reception of Holy Communion. As the old saying goes: *Absence makes the heart grow fonder*, we should all take time in our isolation to reflect on the importance of the Mass and Sacraments in our lives and, in our hunger for the Eucharist, long for the time when we can come together again as a vibrant Christian community.

When we can open our Churches again to celebrate Mass and the Sacraments, possibly at the end of October, or sooner, certain rules will still apply, such as, social distancing of 4 square metres, no congregational singing, and check-in procedures for

congregants (QR code etc.) The Archbishop and other church and faith leaders are presently lobbying the Government to seek an exemption from excluding people who are not fully vaccinated. **If the Government still insists of full vaccination status before anyone can attend any venue, then sadly, we will be required to exclude unvaccinated people from Church services.** There are vaccines readily available, and it would be wise to seek vaccination so that we are all protected against the virus. Otherwise, we will not be able to enjoy the freedoms accorded to the fully vaccinated.

Each day when I say Mass in our empty parish Church, I recall all the faces that usually occupy the pews and I offer the Holy Sacrifice for the wellbeing of all members of our Parish family. May God bless you all and keep you safe.
